Pre-Primary and Primary Registration

Effective February 1, 2023, we will be accepting registrations for the 2023-2024 school year through our new online portal, PowerSchool Enrollment.

Tip: Before you begin, make sure you have the following documents in electronic form (image, PDF or Word document):

- Proof of identity/age with one of the following: birth certificate, passport, immigration papers, or legal adoption papers) if you are new to the HRCE;
- Proof of home address (a recently dated official government or utility document with your current address that includes your name and date, such as water bill, power bill, internet bill, home fuel bill, a tax receipt, property assessment or a mortgage contract); and
- Nova Scotia Health Card or Canadian Province Health Card or, for noncitizens while in Canada, proof of Medical Insurance Information.

Family Literacy Day 2023

Family Literacy Day takes place every January 27th to raise awareness about the importance of reading and engaging in other literacy-related activities as a family.







Building a love of reading with your child:

- Create a reading routine
- Get a library card
- Show an interest in what your child is reading
- Read e-books or listen to audio books
- Create a reading nook
- Read with friends start a book club!
- Swap/trade books with friends
- Give books as gifts





Tips for supporting your child with writing:

- Create a recipe together and write it down
- Have your child write down a grocery list
- Write a story or a song together
- Design a birthday or holiday card
- Write a letter to a friend or loved one

Tips for supporting your child with reading:

- Read aloud to model fluent reading
- Talk about the story together. Ask questions like, "What do you think will happen next?"
- Find a favourite author and read their books
- Read signs or billboards while driving
- Read a variety of books lots of choice!

Tips for supporting your child with oral language development:

- Spend time doing everyday activities actively talk, play and listen together.
- Play games!
- Share in everyday activities such as setting the table, preparing meals and grocery shopping.
- Ask open-ended questions about stories that will encourage conversation and connections to your child's life experiences.
- Talk about the messages and ideas that they are writing, drawing and creating.
- Talk about a book, favorite characters, or how the book could have ended differently.

Guidelines for school and/or bus cancellations due to inclement weather



Nova Scotia winter weather can change quickly and can be challenging to predict. This document outlines the steps we take when deciding whether to cancel school and/or bussing.



All schools are delayed in opening by 2 hours and bus pickups are delayed by 2 hours



All schools are open, but some or all busses are not operating for the day



Some schools (either individually or by family) are closed for the day



All schools are closed for the day

If weather deteriorates, or is forecast to worsen throughout the morning

An 11:00 am announcement could be:

Bussed students will be picked up 2 hours earlier than their regular dismissal time



Walking students will be dismissed at their regularly scheduled lunch hour









How does Halifax Regional Centre for Education (HRCE) decide on school and/ or bus cancellations?

By 4:30 am, HRCE staff begin to gather information from:







- Municipal and provincial transportation staff; and
- · Other local weather services, including Environment Canada and the Weather Network.

By 5:30 am, HRCE staff make recommendations to the Regional Executive Director (or designate), who then makes the final decision.

This decision is communicated by 6:00 am.
